Church Inspections (Saturday 20 May 2019)


Revd Anita Colpus inspected both churches on the morning of 20 April 2019. There were no adverse issues raised.

Congregational Count (Statistics for Mission)


The returns for Statistics for Mission have been made to the diocese. With the exception of Christmas services which appear to fluctuate over time, the weekly attendance at our churches on Sundays has remained fairly static over the past 9 years, although there appears to have been a significant dip in 2013. Over the past 5 years congregational numbers have stabilised at between 50 and 60 on any given Sunday.


It is to be noted that the weekly attendance at Wisdom Stories has been maintained since 2015 and currently accounts for almost one third of the attendance at services in the parish. Several of the young people attending Wisdom Stories were amongst those baptised and confirmed this year. There were 6 baptisms recorded in 2018 compared to 21 in 2019.

Services in Holy Week and Easter were well attended this year, with small gatherings from both churches attending the three services of Compline, the Last Supper on Maundy Thursday and the Easter Vigil on Good Friday. The Easter Family Fun service at The Wisdom of God, held during the morning, was especially well attended and Jackie Cox and Anne Martin-Burns were occupied in clearing away after the activities until well into the early afternoon.

Easter Day services saw a high turn-out at each of our churches with 61 people attending St. Andrew's and 48 at The Wisdom of God.

The numbers in attendance at the Crib Services rose at both churches in 2019. Christmas Eve Communion at The Wisdom of God saw a decline in numbers, which may be attributable to the high turnout at the Crib Service, whilst there was an increase in attendance at Midnight Mass at St. Andrew's. Christmas Day attendance at St. Andrews remained stable.

Mission Action Plan (2019-21)

A summary of the key achievements from the 2017-18 Mission Action Plan (MAP) is presented below:

Key Achievements

- Increase in weekly parish attendance of around 50% due to the participation of children at the Fresh Expressions (fxC) Wisdom Stories at Teatime, award winning Roots Youth Group and Roots Church.
- Record number of baptisms and confirmations in 2019.
- Licenced Lay Minister in Training.
- Increased support of the food bank, primary school, nursing homes.
- Upgrades in Church Hall accommodation.
- Stability in finance over the 3 years of the Plan.

Aspirations

- The provision of an annex equipped with toilets, a meeting room and office to provide additional facilities for the congregation, parishioners and visitors at The Wisdom of God.
- To recruit a wider range of parishioners to voluntary work within our churches.
- To extend Roots Youth Group to running fortnightly with Youth Worker support and Youth Discussion Group.
- ✓ To embed wider pastoral visiting in homes, nursing care
- ✓ To increase giving in the parish through a stewardship campaign in 2021.

The Mission Action Plan of the Parish of Kingswood for 2019 -2021 has been drafted with close reference to the following:

The Anglican Consultative Council's 'Five Marks of Mission';

The 'Five Values for a Missionary Church' set out in 'Mission Shaped Church';

The five goals of the Diocese of Southwark, set out in its vision for mission 'Hearts on Fire with the Love of Christ'.

The Mission Statement of the Parish of Kingswood.

The Key Priorities for 2019-21 are as follows:

Grow community participation

Develop the practice and culture of worship and prayer

Develop within the parish a fuller knowledge and understanding of the Gospel

Address the needs of our wider community

Ensure the financial security of the Parish and its ability to contribute generously to the Parish support fund.

Maintenance and Quinquennial Works

Since the last APCM, gutters and downpipes have been cleared, boilers and fire extinguishers serviced, and PAT testing undertaken at both churches.

At St. Andrew's, urgent roof repair work was completed during the summer, and work has been undertaken to repair the roof where water ingress was taking place. The boiler house roof has been renewed and the drainage problems solved, which is expected to alleviate damp in the south transept.

On 2 November, Frank Foxen arranged a working party, the members of which toiled throughout the heavy rain and the lure of the Rugby World Cup final, to bring about a transformation in the appearance of the churchyard.

At The Wisdom of God the door handle repair has been effected at no cost.

Visit from Bishop Jonathan (Mothering Sunday, 31 March 2019)

Bishop Jonathan's visit to The Wisdom of God, was very successful with good attendance, especially from those children and families who attend Wisdom Stories at Teatime and the uniformed organisations.

Lower Kingswood Village Fete (Monday 6 May 2019)

Jackie Cox, Casey Foulkes and Anne Martin-Burns represented the parish at the Lower Kingswood Village fete on Bank Holiday Monday, 6 May 2019, running a bottle tombola, which appeared to have been well stocked by donations from members of the parish.

Parish Fete (Saturday 7 September 2019)

The Parish Fete was well attended by the local community and the Punch and Judy show was a great draw for the children. Drinks and barbeque food sold out during the afternoon and the wide range of stalls including that run my Kingswood Court were popular.

The net income from the fete was £2,735.00, a very pleasing increase on the £1,845.99 raised in the previous year.

Harvest Festival (Sunday 13 October 2019)

The Harvest Festival services at each church drew reasonably large congregations, with many children and the uniformed organizations being present. Donations to the food bank were significant and we are grateful to Alison Knibbs for her work in arranging the delivery of these to St. Matthew's, Redhill.

All Souls' Evensong (Sunday 3 November 2019)

This was a very moving service, augmented by the choir and offering comfort to those present who were either recently bereaved or remembering loved ones whom they had lost over the years, through an inspiring sermon from Chris.

Remembrance Service (Sunday 10 November 2019)

The Parish gather around the War Memorial on Sunday 10 November for the Remembrance Service, with the Uniformed organizations laying poppies before the main congregation followed suit. Sound was provided by Marcus Martin-Burns, to whom we are grateful for his efforts.

Rejoice and Wassail (Friday 13 December 2019)

Although reasonably well attended, the Rejoice and Wassail concert saw a dip in attendance in 2019 and this conforms to an emerging pattern in respect of its fundraising:

The choir has carried out a review of the event, the format of which it intends to refresh for 2020. It is felt that the concert should continue, given that it is the parishes second biggest fundraiser after the annual fete.

Churchwarden Succession Planning

Ron Searle will complete his 6th successive year as Churchwarden at the APCM. Although this constitutes the limit for service in the role, the Archdeacon of Reigate has agreed that, in the absence of a candidate for the role, he may continue for one further year. Graeme Hopkins has agreed to stand for the post of Deputy Churchwarden at The Wisdom of God, for which the current churchwardens are most grateful.

Anne Bennett has agreed to stand for a further year. There is currently no candidate for a future Churchwarden at St. Andrew's and it is essential the we carry out some significant succession planning in the coming year to ensure that these posts are filled at the next APCM.

Church Hall Committee

Appointment of Treasurer

The Church Hall committee was very sad to say goodbye to Casey Foulkes this year, having served as Treasurer for 13 years, her sense of humour and sound advice are be greatly missed. The committee is grateful to Colin Miles, who has assumed the role on Thursday 9 May 2019. Colin has lived in the village for many years and was treasurer of the Scouts for many years.

Church Hall Committee Membership

Tracey Milbourn, Secretary of the Committee, also stood down from the committee this year and the team is keen to express its gratitude to her for her work over many years.

The Hall continues to be well used and at our next committee meeting we will be thinking about a plan of jobs / renovations that need doing in the next few years.

Alison Newman, who has served the Church Hall Committee so diligently as Chair for the past 10 years, has signalled her intention to step down from the committee at the end of 2020. The committee is seeking a replacement.

Church Hall Accounts

The Church Hall Committee reports to the PCC regularly on the Hall's financial accounts.

The parish's registration with the Charity Commission had required reporting to be arranged in a slightly different fashion than hitherto and Frank Foxen is working with Colin Miles to ensure that Church Hall finances are reported so as to assist in presenting the parish returns in the newly compliant form.

Maintenance

The floor was last treated in 2016 at a cost of £500 and it is necessary that it is waxed again this Summer. The committee will arrange for this work to be completed.

There has been significant expenditure during 2019. The kitchen was fully refurbished at the beginning of the year.

The toilets have been refurbished to a high standard at a cost of £18,734.80, c.£4,234 above the original estimate. The increased expenditure was in respect of upgraded doors, hand driers, kick plates, and a new consumer unit with circuit breakers/trips and RCDs to accommodate the new facilities.

The radiators in the main Hall space are badly chipped and will need to be refurbished in the near future to maintain the overall attractive appearance of the accommodation. It would be desirable that the hall should be fully redecorated when this work is carried out. It was decided to defer this re-decoration of the Hall, the cost of which is estimated at £9,963.00.

It was agreed that the pothole at the entrance of the Church Hall car park would be repaired at a cost of £900.

Wisdom Stories

This has been an exciting year as the Wisdom stories worship continues to thrive with attendance generally form 25 to 30 children. We have a supportive band of helpers who attend virtually every week, organising the preparation of food, setting up and clearing of all the tables and serving the children. Thanks to Jayde Davis for organising the food rota, to Kate Love, Jo Anderson, Amanda Lill and Sarah Dixey for all the food provision and the organisation of the walking bus from school. A large thank you also to Alison Knibbs and Angela Robertson who do a wonderful job every week in setting up serving and clearing up as well as supporting Chris in leading worship.

In September a few of the leaders were able to attend the diocesan day on Refreshing church which stimulated many of us.

Monthly Coffee Circle

Again this continues to be valuable pastoral work in the parish as we have a regular attendance by senior members of our local community. It is our chance to connect with these local people and they are able to hear about events in our parish. We have also formed good links with Rod Asford our local councillor who promotes the church events as well.

Thank you to Lindsay Cole, Val Bays, Judy Parfitt, Shirley Eason and Sharon Childs for all their beautiful cakes and tireless help in running the coffee mornings. Thanks also to Brenda Avery who has been able to help from time to time despite her responsibilities as a full time carer.

Family Fun Sessions

We ran 3 of these sessions in 2019, Sunday 20th January - Topic Epiphany, Good Friday - Topic Easter and Sunday 17th November - Topic Celebration.

The first two were well attended the third less so but the children enjoyed crafts, cooking and games at all the sessions.

Thanks again to all the parents involved in preparation and who attended as well (Dads included!) and in addition thanks to Faye Miles, Jackie Cox and Anne Martin-Burns who commit to helping at all these sessions too.

Pastoral visiting

This continues to be done in a limited ad hoc way with no resource to form a structured visiting team. This remains an aspiration for the future.

On 19/02 Chris and I attended a carers' conference organised jointly by both Southwark and Chichester Diocese in Reigate. A very interesting and informative day and useful links were established within the deanery.

On 16/03 Jackie Cox and I were invited to a tea with Bishop Jonathan to celebrate Youth work within the south of the diocese. Again a useful networking event with lots of information on youth work. This was our first exposure to the CSI program developed by Christ church Purley and was an inspiring experience. Something we hope to develop within our parish in 2021 with local schools.

Deanery Synod

The role of Deanery Synod Representative is to act as an intermediary between the local PCC and the synod, representing the views of the parish at the synod meetings and feeding the issues raised by the Synod back to the PCC. Jane Hollington and I were elected to be the parish representatives for 3 years in April 2017.

There are three meetings each year with the venue rotating around the churches in the deanery. The meetings always include an act of worship.

The deanery has focussed on the following areas over the past three-year term.

Refugees

Reigate & Banstead started in 2015 to help refugee families from Syria and it was felt that the Reigate Deanery would like to support this initiative. It was agreed by Synod that television and wi-fi would be something that Reigate Deanery could supply.

Currently the deanery has provided 10 televisions and wi-fi for 6 families and this has been very successful and much appreciated. Other refugee families are to be supported by R&B moving forward and this is something the Deanery may well continue to support.

Social Justice

Reigate Archdeaconry Social Justice Focus (RASJF) has come together and incorporates representatives from Reigate Deanery, Tandridge Deanery and Sutton Deanery. They currently focus on 3 main areas of Social Justice needs:1. Modern Slavery, 2. Youth Violence & 3. County Lines. A forum was put on to cover the 3 issues above. It became clear that there were crossovers in these areas and also with domestic violence and teenage mental health, so these have been added to the areas to be focused on by RASJF.

Thy Kingdom Come

Thy Kingdom Come has been happening across the Deanery for the last 2 years and has four elements to it: The Ascension Day service; A prayer space for the public all week in Redhill Tabernacle; A prayer walk and Pentecost in the Park. See below for dates for 2020

Conferences

Conferences have been run which have enabled relationships to grow between the church and local authorities (and other volunteer agencies) and those without church affiliation. It is realised that individual churches can no longer meet the full needs of others in isolation and that working together is more beneficial. Conferences can be very powerful. Bringing together people from both sacred and secular backgrounds to focus on wider community issues and discover a common passion to make life better for people.

The Deanery have run 3 conferences (2 @ St. Matthews, 1 @ St. Bede's School). Churches have done this working together and been the enabler to bring people together, which has proved really valuable and important.

There was also a Carer's Conference and more recently the Social Justice Forum

Quiet Days

Reigate Deanery hosts a Quiet Day on the Saturday before Palm Sunday (this year Sat 4th April) at Wychcroft, near Bletchingly.

Wychcroft is a Southwark Diocesan Training Centre set in a Victorian country house which is an ideal place for a Quiet Day and generates an atmosphere of peace and tranquillity. The day is from 9.30am – 4pm with 3 sessions, Eucharist and an appointed speaker. There are quiet times in between for reflection or wandering around the beautiful grounds. It provides a lovely time to be peaceful. Refreshments & lunch are provided. A quiet day is an excellent way to lead into Holy Week. Speakers always give everyone lots to think about and take away.

Youth & Children - Parish Reps

5 years ago Southwark Diocese decided to have Parish Reps and a "Deanery Champion" for Youth & Children working together.

Active Parish Reps for children and young people from all churches is really useful. The meetings and community are very valuable to enable joined up and focused work.

Deanery Financial Support of Youth Trips

The Deanery supports trips for children within the wider church family an example of which is seen below. Amy is a youth worker at St. Margaret's, Chipstead. Last year the Deanery helped fund a youth group sailing week to the Norfolk Broads, led by Amy. The Deanery funded the mini-bus so they could all travel up together and paid for two of the young people who otherwise couldn't afford to go.

Twelve young people went along for sailing and did lots of fun activities and shared worship. Was a great learning and growing weekend for the everyone involved. The trip is happening again this year with 9 booked so far and hopes for 2 more.

Wholeness & Healing Services

In 2015 a small group of interested people within the Deanery explored the possibility of a Healing Ministry. They wanted to offer periodic services within the Deanery to churches where healing services were not necessarily part of what they would do.

The first service was held at All Saints, Merstham in July 2016 and since had many other services. The services are described as "a time to rest and worship in God's presence".

They involve music, bible readings, sometimes eucharist and each service has a time for quietness and reflection and bringing hurt and pain to God. A major part is seeking (and receiving) individual prayer at a prayer station.

Next Service is at All Saints, Merstham - 29th March - "Come and See!"

Courses

A course was run 2 years ago which arose out of Synod discussion around the 5 marks of mission. The course was around "How Can I Tell?", which is sometimes quite difficult, but important. The course had two parts: 1st part – "What should we tell?" and the 2nd part – "How should we go out and tell people?"

People tend to attend courses run in their own church – so it is anticipated running courses in different churches to draw in different people to learn together.

Make Lunch

The deanery is exploring how to respond to holiday hunger. It is anticipated that Make Lunch will happen this coming Summer 2020 to provide lunches for those in need. Priest in Charge Report

Out of necessity, this report is for the Calendar Year 2019 because this is when our Financial year runs and to meet the requirements of the Church Representational Rules and Charity Commission requirements.

Worship

I'm grateful to the Church Wardens for the comprehensive information provided on worship attendance in their report.

At the Wisdom of God, Wisdom Stories at Tea Time on Wednesdays continues to maintain its strength and is the best attended service in the parish with regularly up to 30 children and up to a dozen adults. A "Walking Bus" continues to operate from Kingswood Primary School organised by parent helpers using WhatsApp. My thanks go to the many volunteers whose support for this Fresh Expression of worship is invaluable. A number of them were Baptised and Confirmed in November 2019 and we hope to do more to help this continue to nurture a lasting faith when the children move on to Secondary School and through our youth work.

ROOTS Church, on the second Sunday of the month, no longer has the help from Rev'd Anna Moore and Archdeacon Moira Astin. However, my husband, Rev'd Martin Colton, Vicar of St Mark's, Reigate, has helped me continue with Roots since September. Roots Church is a service provision for those in school years 6 and above. This begins with food and then have craft and drama activities which feed in to their closing act of worship. More helpers are needed to facilitate this further Fresh Expression of worship in the parish if it is to be sustainable.

Sunday Family Fun continues to run once a term on a Sunday afternoon. This gives the children and their families an opportunity to spend time reflecting on the biblical theme for the worship that day. It is well attended and I'm grateful for those who support this by helping prepare and facilitate the activities.

I continue to hold a monthly Communion Service at Furze Hill Lodge and at Kingswood Court with the addition of services of Hymns and prayers for Harvest and Christmas at Kingswood Court. At Warrengate Care Home I am extremely grateful to Anne Bennett who comes to play the piano for the monthly service of Hymns and prayers.

Remembrance Sunday

Remembrance Sunday was, by popular demand, again held entirely at St Andrew's beginning with an act of commemoration and two minutes silence at the War Memorial. The service then moved inside the church and young people from the uniformed organisations, having paraded their flags, were provided with age appropriate activities in the St Andrew's room and the vestry during the formal worship. They joined the congregation again for the blessing and National Anthem. My thanks go especially to Marcus Martin-Burns who provided the sound system at the War Memorial and to those who provided the activities for the young people.

All Souls' Service

Our Annual All Souls' Service was well attended. Many of those who had expressed a wish to be invited back came along with others from the parish.

Occasional Offices

Over the year, it has been a pleasure to Baptize a record 21 children. 12 Young people from the parish were confirmed in November at St Mark's, Reigate.

I have had the privilege of officiating at 11 Funeral services during the course of the year. There was just 1 wedding.

Ministry Team

I have been meeting with two others for prayer in church early most Wednesdays. These regular prayers greatly support the life and ministry of the parish.

Graeme and Alison Knibbs run the Wednesday evening study group. I am very grateful to them for their contributions in this. I look forward to Ron Searle being Licensed as a Reader next year and am thankful for the help he is already giving me in the parish. I am grateful to Linda Utting for all that she does to support me in my ministry in the parish and in conducting her ministry as SPA in her own right.

Safeguarding

Jane Hollington and Ron Searle have been Safeguarding Officers for the parish in 2019 for which I am very grateful. Jane has now stepped down from this role and Ron will be stepping down shortly. I look forward to working with Lizzie Searle as Parish Safeguarding Officer in the new year. The PCC has complied with the duty under section 5 of the Safeguarding and Clergy Discipline Measure 2016 (duty to have due regard to House of Bishops' guidance on safeguarding children and vulnerable adults). A nil return was sent for this parish in the Church of England Past Cases Review.

The ROOTS Youth Club: A Youth Worker from Surrey Clubs for Young People has been engaged on a sessional basis and a number of grants have been made to the club to fund this. My thanks to Jackie Cox, our Children's and Youth Champion and all the volunteers for their work with this.

Uniformed Organisations

Links with the local uniformed organisations are healthy and the parade services include an opportunity for the young people to bring their flags and contribute their own prayers and poems as part of the worship.

Schools Work

Various classes have visited as part of their Religious Education curriculum and it's always a pleasure to meet with them. I regularly visit Kingswood Primary School to take assemblies and receive a great welcome from the children who all seem to know me. Once again we welcomed the school into The Wisdom of God for their annual Nativity Plays and this offers such an opportunity to bring in parents and carers from the community who otherwise might not enter the church.

There continued to be a steady stream of groups visiting the Wisdom of God where special arrangements were made to welcome them. I would like to thank Judy Parfitt, Lindsay

Cole, Alison Knibbs and Ron Searle for accommodating these visits when I have been unable to attend myself.
